# Beth found a new beginning

As a result of domestic violence, Beth\* was on the street for five months feeling lost and scared. However, kind support like yours helped give her a fresh start.

Like so many women who walk through our doors, Beth had found herself in an abusive and violent relationship. As she told us, "He put my neck in a brace and I was actually bedridden for about 12 weeks. Once I was physically capable of doing so, I got out of the property. Because of the housing crisis, I wasn't able to find anywhere to live.

I ended up in a refuge and was subject to a lot of violence from another person staying there. I was very depressed and scared. I felt very lost and I didn't know what was going to happen to me. I was on the streets and going through different refuges for about five months before I came into The Salvation Army service."

### Finding hope

Beth found the support she urgently needed at the Salvos. Salvation Army Case Worker, Brodie, has been supporting Beth from the beginning... "When Beth first came to us, we started with a lot of emotional support. We looked at appropriate accommodation together and talking about any goals that she has."



## A new beginning

Thanks to support like yours, we made sure Beth had somewhere safe to stay. It was here that she began to rebuild her life, and started studying for a new career.

"At last I had my own little apartment. I felt like I had somewhere safe. My aim is to be a support worker in the domestic violence sector and to help other women the way I have been helped. I wouldn't have been able to start the journey that I'm almost finished without this support."

## Looking to the future

Today, thanks to your support, Beth is in a much better place.

"I just want to keep pushing for better, because I see things in such a different light now. I've healed so much inside me. Not only have the Salvos given me a home, they've given me so much more. I don't know where I would have ended up without them."

Thank you for making new beginnings like this possible.

The main things that anyone really needs are food, shelter and water, and the Salvos provided that, and a lot more.

Phil's relationship with the Salvos began with help in a crisis. Now the Salvos community is a big part of his life.

Last winter, we appealed for your support to help older Australians like Phil who are experiencing homelessness and isolation. We would like to say a very big thank you to all of you who responded so generously.

You may recall Phil spent six months living in his ute, surviving on baked beans he warmed on a camping stove. Thanks to the compassion and kindness of Salvos supporters, Phil found a home and so much more. As his Salvos Case Worker Linda explains, Phil has become part of the family...

"We love Phil. He's a special part of our lives here. He's come from a place of being in despair and not knowing what's going to happen next, to having his housing sorted, and this strong sense of belonging, and family."

Phil is a huge part of his local Salvos community now attending weekly men's Bible groups, community meals, and he is also planning to start using his carpentry skills to make toys and furniture to donate to the Salvos.

in the aftermath of Christmas disaster

Fifty years on, we recently paid tribute to those who tragically died on Christmas Day in the Cyclone Tracy disaster in 1974. It was an opportunity to reflect on the resilience displayed by Darwin's residents, as they rebuilt their city and their lives, after 80 per cent of the city was devastated.

Despite not having an Emergency Services department at that time, the Salvos workers and volunteers were there supporting the evacuation of residents. Providing clothing and approximately 25,000 meals for Darwin residents and evacuees who lost everything in the most destructive cyclone ever recorded in Australia.

Learnings from the disaster shaped the way The Salvation Army prepare for and respond to emergencies, and this event was the catalyst that created the Emergency Services department that we have today. Thanks to support like yours, these life-saving services have been there ever since, and will be ready to provide emergency support again in the future.
